



## DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

### God Has Spoken

1. Before this study, how would you have described the way God communicates with people? Has anything shifted in how you think about that after today?
2. What's the difference between general revelation and special revelation? Why is general revelation not enough to know God personally on its own?
3. Jesus warned the Pharisees that they searched the Scriptures but missed him entirely. How is it possible to be deeply familiar with the Bible and still miss the point of it? What does that caution look like in your own life?
4. "When we open our Bibles, God opens his mouth." What does it mean to approach Scripture as an act of listening? What makes that difficult?
5. The Bible was written by nearly 40 different human authors over 1,500 years — and yet tells one unified story. What does that tell you about the nature of Scripture and the God behind it?
6. What does it mean that the Bible is "inspired" by God? How does the idea of co-authorship — God speaking through human voices — shape the way you read it?
7. Hebrews 4:12 describes the Word of God as "living and active." Have you ever experienced Scripture feeling alive and relevant to something specific you were walking through? What was that like?
8. If the Bible is ultimately leading us to Jesus, how does that change the way we approach the parts of Scripture that feel confusing, irrelevant, or hard to understand?
