## DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

### A People Who Participate

1. When you hear “be fruitful and multiply,” what assumptions or images come to mind first? How does the session expand that command beyond its most obvious reading?
2. God promised Abraham and Sarah—an elderly, barren couple—that their family would multiply and become a blessing to all nations. What does it mean to you that God chooses impossible, ordinary people to carry forward his mission?
3. Acts 2 shows that fruitfulness isn’t something God’s people manufacture—it’s something the Spirit produces. Where in your life are you trying to produce fruit by your own effort rather than trusting the Spirit to work through surrender?
4. The calling to multiply the kingdom extends to everyone—single, married, those without children, or in any season of life. What does spiritual multiplication look like for you specifically, in the life you are living right now.
5. 1 Corinthians 12 says each person is given a manifestation of the Spirit for the common good—not to make them impressive, but to build up the body. What do you think your gifts are, and how are they currently being used for others rather than for yourself?
6. The word vocation can also be translated as “voice.” Where is your unique voice—shaped by your story, gifts, and experience—most needed in God’s mission right now?
7. Jesus tells his disciples in Mark 10 that greatness in his kingdom looks like servanthood, not status. Where do you find it hardest to lead or participate with a servant’s heart rather than seeking recognition or influence?
8. As you finish this study: What is one concrete step you want to take this week to participate in God’s kingdom in your unique circumstances?
